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A preposition shows how a noun or pronoun relates to another word in a sentence. An adverb is a word that modifies a verb, an adjective, or another adverb. Some words can be used as either adverbs or prepositions. To determine whether a word is an adverb or a preposition, look at how it is used in the sentence. Adverbs are used alone, but prepositions always have an object.
